


**Q1 Would you feel comfortable sending your child out on a School trip, during the rest of this academic year?**



## Q2 Would your answer be different based on the destination of the trip?



Threat levels in themselves however do not require specific responses from the public or schools etc - they are for security practitioners to determine the response required.
